Whoever would have believed that drinking in a pub would go out of fashion? We also had seven milking herds of cows scattered around the parish.

Times have changed and we must expect that because society itself has changed out of all recognition this past fifty years or so. Supposing that the church closed, which it might, it would be stripped of all the good bits, locked up and we might be allowed into it once a year or so for a special service. This would suit the bats and other wildlife that live in various parts of it, but it would be the death knell for the school children who get so excited when they come in for services. It would be the end for Christmas services like Christingle and the carol services. It would be the end for people wanting to get married, buried, christened in the 'family church' and it would be the end of Sunday worship for the congregation.

But, God has been busy in the village and has sent us a number of new, youngish, forward looking people who have joined the group who make decisions about the church. These people, along with us oldies, are open to all sorts of ideas to keep the money coming in to fund the upkeep of such a magnificent building. I've seen churches around the country doubled up as a village shop, café, indoor glamping and village hall and all sorts.

So, with that in mind, we are organising Strawberry Cream Teas at Hunt's Court on 20th August, 4 – 6pm with the aim of having a good time, raising funds for the Children's Society and getting ideas, however wild, to find an income for the church, and modern uses for the oldest village building, so that we can use it rather than have it locked up and decaying!
